Dear Parishioners, Friends, and Visitors to the Cathedral,

On March 23rd, the Church will celebrate a little known Saint, who became one of the greatest missionary bishops of all time – Saint Turibius of Mogrovejo. He was born in 1538, as the second son of the lord of Mogrovejo, in the Kingdom of Leon (Spain). From an early age, he had a strong attraction to the things of God. Even as a child, he would often pray and fast, and seek out occasions to serve the poor. Turibius also had a strong devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and would regularly pray the rosary. He went on to study law and was eventually made professor of law at the University of Salamanca. His intellect, character, and holiness of life attracted the attention of King Phillip II, who appointed him as chief judge in the court of the inquisition.

Five years later, when the Diocese of Peru was in need of a bishop, the king readily nominated him for the post. Turibius immediately objected, he did not think that he was up to the task, principally because he was not a member of the clergy. His protestations, however, were dismissed by the Church and the king, and in short order, Turibius was ordained a priest and consecrated a bishop. He arrived in Peru in 1581, and found the diocese, because it was an ocean away from the Pope and the king, in deplorable shape. The Church there was filled with injustices and scandals – oppression of the native peoples who were being treated as inferiors by the Spanish conquistadors, people were losing their souls in pursuit of wealth, and laxity among the clergy was rampant. Saint Turibius responded with constant prayer and penance as he traveled around the diocese preaching the Gospel, caring for the poor and oppressed, and establishing hospitals, schools, and seminaries (Turibius established the first seminary in the new world). To the indigenous people of Peru, Turibius was beloved, as he stood up for their rights and exhibited charity toward them that was befitting of their status as sons and daughters of God. But to those colonists who were living a non-Christian life, he was an unwelcome prophetic voice, calling them to live their Catholic faith. This straightforward honesty and zeal, often garnered him strong opposition and harsh criticism from the Spanish.

Throughout his time as bishop, Saint Turibius would make three visitations across the difficult terrain of his extremely large diocese, staying in each place for several days, often without adequate provisions or accommodations. He learned several of the native dialects in order to better share the Gospel with the indigenous people, even publishing catechisms in the Indian languages. Turibius also worked tirelessly to reform the clergy, and likewise, united the diocese administratively, by holding several local councils of the clergy. Despite the broad sweeping reforms of the diocese, Saint Turibius was also known to travel several days just to reach a single person and bring that person the good news of the Gospel. In 1606, he became seriously ill and decreed that all of his possessions should be distributed to the poor. After 25 years of tireless service to the poor and the oppressed, sharing the Gospel with the people of the new world, and working to reform the corruption of his diocese, Saint Turibius died on March 23rd. A year later his body was discovered to be incorrupt (meaning it had not decomposed). He was canonized in 1726, and is the patron saint of native people’s rights, Latin American Bishops, and Peru.

There is an expression, “God does not call the qualified; rather he qualifies the called.” How often throughout the Church’s history have the most unlikely candidates been called by God to do some great work in His name. Saint Turibius did not believe that he was worthy of, or up to, the task of being the bishop of Peru, and yet God supplied exactly what he needed to accomplish this task with distinction. We too can be similarly avoidant of what God is inviting us to do, because we don’t think we have what it takes, but we should never forget that, if God calls us to some purpose, He will also give us what we need to accomplish it.

THE CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES COLLECTION next

week, March 25/26, supports Catholic Church organizations that carry out international relief and solidarity efforts. Programs include relief and resettlement for victims of persecution, war, and natural

disasters; development projects to improve living conditions for the poor; legal and support services for poor immigrants; peace and reconciliation work for people suffering from violence; and advocacy on behalf of the powerless.

In the developing world, it is often hard for families to support themselves and their children. Sophie, a widow in a village in Burkina Faso, was struggling to feed her family and pay for schooling for her children. Through one of the CRSC-supported organizations, her village was able to set up a Savings and Internal Lending Community (SILC). Through the SILC, members contribute what they can afford, allowing them to pool their resources and save collectively. Sophie was able to take out a \$200 loan through the SILC, to cover startup costs for her own canteen, a sum that would be nearly impossible for her to save. Her canteen has been very successful and began to pay off in only six months. Her community has benefited too, as she has been able to hire three assistants to work with her. Without the SILC and the work of CRS, it would have been nearly impossible for her, and others like her, to create a sustainable life for her and her family.

In keeping with the theme “Help Jesus in Disguise,” the funds collected through the CRS Collection support vital Catholic programs that share in the Catholic mission of promoting the sacredness of human life and the dignity of the human person.

Funds acquired from the CRS Collection are distributed to six organizations: **Catholic Relief Services** for international relief and development; **Migration and Refugee Services**; **Catholic Legal Immigration Network Inc.**; **Department of Justice, Peace, & Human Development**; **Secretariat of Cultural Diversity in the Church**; & the **Holy Father’s Relief Fund** for disaster relief.

Knights of Columbus - Are you aware of what our Parish Knights of Columbus, Council # 733, does in our faith community? Each year, through the RSVP program, four Seminarians are sponsored jointly by the local Council #733 and the Supreme Council located in New Haven, CT. Through the support of our members, we have assisted many to complete their schooling and be ordained. Some of the priests that we have sponsored have gone on to be Military Chaplains, missionaries, and pastors. This is just one way we Brother Knights can continue to support our faith.

LENT 2017

ABSTINENCE - The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday (Canons 97 and 1252). The Fridays of the season of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. One should seek to do more rather than less. Fast and abstinence on the days prescribed should be considered a minimum response to the Lord’s call to penance and conversion.



Give up, Take Up, Lift Up - In a particular way during Lent, we are asked to devote ourselves to the spiritual and corporal works of mercy that “*remind us that faith finds expression in concrete everyday actions meant to help our neighbors in body and spirit.*”

Take inspiration for your Lenten journey from the prayers of the Church and from Scripture, to fast and to give alms. The fasting that all do together on Fridays is but a sign of the daily Lenten discipline of individuals and households: fasting for certain periods of time, fasting from certain foods, but also fasting from other things and activities. Likewise, the giving of alms is some effort to share this world equally—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents.

Stewardship of the Earth

- As Christians, we believe that the earth is entrusted to our faithful stewardship. We are not its owners, but its caretakers on behalf of God. How can I be a good steward?

How Can I Reduce Garbage?

The mantra of recycling is **Reduce, Re-use, Recycle**. One way we can help the environment is to reduce the amount of waste we produce. This eliminates the need to recycle it and prevents it from ending up in a landfill. Here are some things you can do to reduce garbage:

- Use a reusable lunch bag or box, you won't need to throw away a paper bag every day!
- When you make a purchase, don't take a bag unless you absolutely need one.
- Rent things you use infrequently instead of purchasing them.
- Use cloth instead of paper napkins.
- Use a sponge or cloth instead of paper towels.
- Look for items that use little or no packaging.
- Use reusable plastic containers for food instead of plastic bags.
- Use plates, cups, and utensils that can be washed instead of ones you throw away.
- Avoid buying foods in single serving packages.

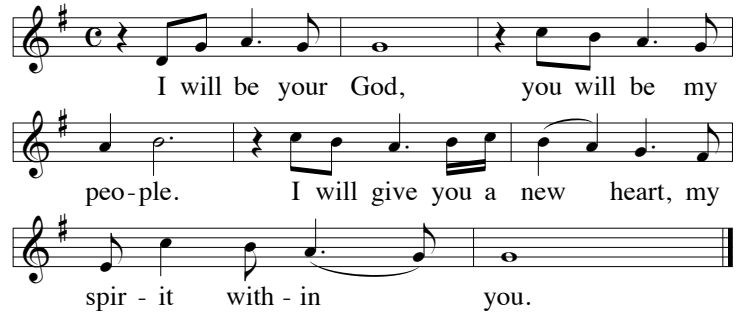

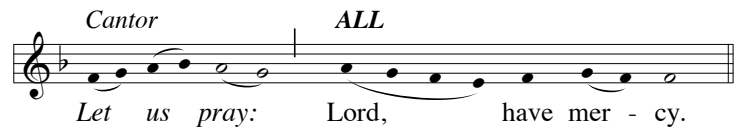
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.

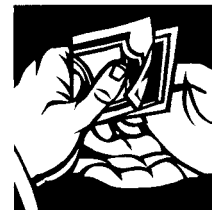

FIFTEEN-MINUTE CATECHISM - Ask yourself this: *could you spare 15 minutes a month?* The last Sunday of each month features an opportunity called: “15-Minute Catechism.” The purpose of this program is to ask and answer a question related to our Catholic Faith. Next weekend, stay after the 4:30 Mass on Mar. 25, or the 8:00 am Mass on Mar. 26, for this opportunity.

MORNING PRAYER GROUPS - Please consider joining our weekly gatherings from 6:30-7:00 am in the Lower Sacristy of the Cathedral. Using the scriptures for the coming Sunday, these groups share their faith and some fellowship over a cup of coffee. The women’s group gathers on Tuesdays, and the men’s group on Fridays. CENTERING PRAYER is a spiritual practice of our Catholic contemplative tradition that opens us more deeply to a relationship with God in faith and intimacy. Our group meets on Monday evenings from 6:30-8:00 pm in the Lower Sacristy.



HAVING A BABY? - It is most appropriate to provide children with the grace of the Sacrament of Baptism and to welcome them into the community of faith within six months of birth. For first time parents, formation is required regarding Christian parenting and the teaching of the Church. While a Godmother and Godfather are traditional, only one sponsor is required for baptism and must be a practicing, registered Catholic who can obtain a “sponsor letter” from their parish. Christians of other denominations may serve as a “Christian Witness” and must also provide evidence of their church membership. Fr. Sean Ralph can assist any parishioner with instructions & planning infant baptism.

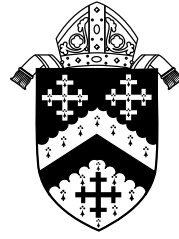

Attempting to pick up the pieces of one's life after the tragedy of divorce is an area that can impact a person's relationship with God and the Church. One of the significant issues that a person faces is their place in the Church. Does the Church still care about me even though I am divorced? Am I allowed

to go to Mass? Can I receive communion? How can the Church help me heal? If I decide to marry again, what do I have to do?

The Tribunal of the Diocese of Cleveland offers its First Step Program to help individuals deal with these questions in order to renew and/or strengthen their relationship with God and the Church. This program is offered to help everyone, especially those who have experienced divorce, learn more about Catholic teaching regarding marriage, divorce, and remarriage. Representatives from the Ministry to the Divorced Office of the Department for Marriage and Family Ministry will also be present to explain the resources they offer to the divorced.

Everyone is welcome to:

- Deepen knowledge of the Church's teaching on marriage.
- Learn about the Church's ministry to the divorced/separated in the Diocese.
- Hear about the annulment process and how to submit a case.
- Discover a path to healing after divorce in order to strengthen and/or renew a relationship with God and the Church
